Dear friends,

Sometimes in the everyday routine of ministry it's easy to forget what we're really about as a church: sharing God's love with the lonely, the hurting, the hungry and the sick.

Every quarter we have a Service for Wholeness and Healing at IPC. These services provide a time for people to come and offer prayers for themselves or a loved one in need. They are always sparsely attended. That's fine, though the administrator in me always wants to ask "Is this a good use of everyone's time and energy? Are these services meeting a need?" I was sharing some of these questions with Amy Williams, our organist, as she and I readied for last month's service, and she said, "Does it help the people who come? That's really what matters."

And sure enough, this past month we had two people attend whom I had never seen before. I'm always touched and honored when people visit our church for the first time. That's a risk, coming into a brand new community, not knowing what you'll find. Add to that the dynamic of coming to a *service for wholeness...* and that's a level of bravery and faith that touches me deeply!

The next part is hard to articulate, but suffice to say that I had a clear sense that God was caring for these unknown individuals through the service. Very little was said on their part. Very little was done on my part—just some reflections and some prayers, really. But the Holy Spirit was present, and that's what matters. Our little service made a big impact.

This is what we're about. This is why we support IPC financially and with our presence and volunteer efforts—because it makes a difference in the lives of real people, whether they're long-time members or folks who will come once and never again. Thank you for sharing your time and your resources with this community. In this month's Panorama, you'll hear more about ways to get involved in God's work this fall. 

Have you always wanted to bring that certain friend to our tiny church? This is a good excuse to call them and save the date! We will be honoring the work done by **Stand Proud**. This organization was presented to us by Yolande Miller who has witness the impact it has on children in the community.

<u>Stand Proud</u> is a non-profit that works in six cities in the Democratic Republic of Congo, to provide corrective treatment, locally-crafted leg braces, and accompanying rehabilitative services, at no cost to poor families with children who have been disabled by <u>polio</u> or who have similar disabilities, and promote the full integration of disabled persons into society.

The people who work for Stand Proud are a pretty awesome bunch, and have currently helped over 2,500 children and adults access rehabilitative equipment, casting and corrective surgery, pre and post-operative care, and education. Additionally, the people who are employed in Stand Proud's workshops to create and fit new braces, were rehabilitated by Stand Proud, and now lead mainstream lives. http://www.standproud.org/


Bone Marrow Registry Drive

IPC Hosts Peer-to-Peer Recovery Curriculum by National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Sept 25 to Nov 27th, (10 weeks), 7-9pm



Peer-to-Peer is a unique, experiential learning program for people with any serious mental illness who are interested in establishing and maintaining their wellness and recovery. **The course will be provided at no cost to participants, and open to the community.**

The class is facilitated by trained, volunteer Peer Mentors of NAMI-Northern Virginia, the local affiliate for the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).

Peer-to-Peer consists of ten two-hour units and is taught by a team of two trained "Mentors" and a volunteer support person who are personally experienced at living well with mental illness. Mentors are trained in an intensive three day training session and are supplied with teaching manuals.

Participants come away from the course with a binder of hand-out materials, as well as many other tangible resources: an advance directive; a "relapse prevention plan" to help identify tell-tale feelings, thoughts, behavior, or events that may warn of impending relapse and to organize for intervention; mindfulness exercises to help focus and calm thinking; and survival skills for working with providers and the general public.
